Congress for Americanism and the SCD was the envy of the nation. We have a great deal of men out doing a super job and no reason we can't repeat.



129th Annual Congress Costa Mesa, California

The 129th Annual Congress was hosted by the California Society in the Costa Mesa suburb of Las Angeles, California 6-10 July 2019. And while it may never rain in Southern California that cannot be said about earthquakes as there were three that occurred in the week we were there!

The Kansas SAR was represented by Society President Bobbie Hulse, Trustee Brooks Lyles and Past President and Trustee elect Dennis Nelson. Also attending and representing the Kansas Ladies were First Lady and Ladies Auxiliary President Debbie Hulse and past Auxiliary President Diane Ungvarsky. The week started Saturday with sponsored tours of The Huntington Library



Presidential Library and Lyons Air Museum in the morning and the Host Society Reception that evening aboard ship for a



Newport
Beach. The food was fantastic and the views spectacular!

Sunday began the real work of the Congress with the Color Guard Breakfast, the Joseph Rumbaugh Orations Contest, the judging of the Americanism Poster Contest entries, a Trustees Meeting and the Memorial Service honoring all the



compatriots who have left us since the last Congress. The Memorial Service included the largest annual gathering of the National Color Guard at Castaways Park with a review by the President General in the morning then movement to Saint Andrew's Presbyterian Church, the site of the

Memorial Service and presentation of the colors for the ceremony. The ceremony is followed by the First Lady's Tea which features many of the women in their finest Colonial Dress.



Sunday evening is the Rumbaugh Orations Contest. Unfortunately our Kansas representative this year was unable to attend the Congress to compete at the national level.

Monday morning marked the official Opening Session of the 128th Annual Congress. The National Color Guard presented the colors and the National Society Leadership were introduced and seated. Greetings were presented by representatives of local government, many of the major hereditary and genealogical societies in the country as well as the American Legion. Following the Opening Session



was the Youth
Awards Luncheon where we recognize all the Youth Contest Award winners of the National Society. The winners are introduced and get to read their essays. The highlight of the luncheon is usually the presentation by the Rumbaugh Oration Winner of their winning

oration from the night before, but this year it was the announcement that the Poster from Delaware Crossing came in second in the nation. It will be on display at National Headquarters in Louisville for the next year!

Monday is Recognition Night with the introduction of this year's Minuteman Class (see next article) and the Awards to State, Chapter and Individuals Awards Presentation. Kansas kicked butt again this year and was joined by Missouri and Texas as the SCD ran away with many of the awards that matter. Kansas received



participation streamers for the CAR, Rumbaugh Oration, Knight Essay, Eagle Scout, Americanism Poster and Adams Brochure Contests; and streamers for the Admiral Furlong Flag Certificate program, Officer's Attendance; and Public Service and Heroism Commendations reporting. Kansas came in third again for the most DAR Referrals. John Schatzel placed third and received the Florence Kendal Medal for personally recruiting the third most new compatriots in the country (94/56/55). The Henry Leavenworth Chapter was one of 39 Chapters nationwide to receive the PG's Education Outreach Streamer. The most significant awards received were for the Liberty Americanism Award presented to the Henry Leavenworth Chapter for presenting evidence of the best implementation of SAR resolutions and principles, and the President General' State Society and Chapter Activities Competition Award to the Kansas Society (500-999 members). The South Central District swept 3 of the 4 categories with Missouri winning for the 200-499 member category and Texas for the 1000+.



Tuesday morning kicked off with the South Central

District Breakfast. The Mighty SCD is composed of five states and often goes bν MOKAT, Missouri, Oklahoma, Kansas, Arkansas and Texas. It is one of the larger and more influential districts and for the last year it has been led by Vice President General Dan McMurray of Missouri. There were 30 members of the District in attendance. We heard from the candidates for National Offices to include the SAR Foundation Board, the fund raising wing component of the National Organization. Following the visit of the candidates and State Society President's reports, VPG McMurray passed the gavel to new VPG Darrell Heffley of Oklahoma. The next South Central District Meeting will be 23-24 August in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Come join us and show Kansas' continued support for the SCD.

The second General Session of the Congress convened at 0900 and went the rest of the day with a break for the George Washington Fellow's and VPGs Luncheon where new GW Fellows were recognized. Brooks Lyles was elected to a three year term on the George Washington Endowment Board by the GW

Fellows. In the afternoon Committee Reports were completed, Formal Nominations for National Offices as by the **Nominating** approved Committee were formalized and any candidates running from the floor introduced. The General were Session was closed and delegates broke to attend committee meetings, Color Guardsmen got the flags ready for the evening's banquet and balloting took place for the only contested position, that of Registrar General, between Doug Collins (KY) and John Thornhill (NC).

Wednesday morning was the final session of the Congress where unfinished business was conducted and all the new General Officers, VPGs and State Trustees were sworn in. The meeting ended at 1100 and a tour of The Mission at San Juan Capistrano was enjoyed by many folks while others took in the local culture for the rest of the day. That evening

If you are a graphic designer, or know of a good graphic designer, then please share this with them.

The winning logo submitted will receive a prize of \$5,000.00. The two runner ups will receive \$1,000.00 each. The criteria for the logo are as follows:

- 1. The logo must be simple
- 2. The logo must be clean in appearance
- 3. There should be a maximum of 4 colors
- 4. The logo should convey a sense of patriotism
- 5. Fonts and colors must be commercially available
- 6. The logo, when viewed by the public, should make them think of the Sons of the American Revolution
- 7. The logo can easily be used to put on materials for clothing, glassware, etc.
- 8. The logo, when sewn, should have a stitch count of 7,000 or less.
- 9. The logo should be submitted in .tif format
- 10. The submitted logo(s) should be 4.98" x 6.64" Contest Rules
- 1. Logos must be submitted by midnight December 31, 2019. Any submissions after that will not be considered.
- 2. Logos must be submitted using the <u>Contest</u> Application Form found on the SAR website.
- 3. The entrant shall assign to the Sons of the American Revolution any and all rights, title and interest in the submitted logo, and appoint the Sons of the American Revolution as his/her attorney-in-fact to apply for any and all applicable intellectual property rights in favor of the Sons of the American Revolution.
- 4. To the extent that any intellectual property rights remain in the entrant, the entrant shall grant a perpetual royalty free worldwide, exclusive, irrevocable, assignable license in and to the logo to the Sons of the American Revolution.
- 5. The logo cannot infringe the rights of any third party.
- 6. Judging will be done by three parties. A committee will narrow the submissions to 10 finalists. The Executive Committee will narrow those 10 down to three. The Board of Trustees will choose the winner.
- 7. Prize winnings can be paid directly to a school. If the winner chooses to take the prize money, they will be subject to income tax laws.
